The Battle of Towton was fought on March 29, 1461, during the Wars of the Roses(1455-1485) and was the largest and bloodiest battle ever fought on British soil. Having been crowned earlier in March, Yorkist Edward IV moved north to engage Henry VI's Lancastrian forces.
