Recognized patients' rights. The Charter of Patients' Rights lists seventeen rights that patients are entitled to: Right to information: Every patient has the right to know what is the illness that they are suffering, its causes, the status of the diagnosis (provisional or confirmed), expected costs of treatment. Furthermore, service providers should communicate this in a manner that is understandable for the patient.

These include the right: To courtesy, respect, dignity, and timely, responsive attention to his or her needs. To receive information from their physicians and to have opportunity to discuss the benefits, risks, and costs of appropriate treatment alternatives, including the risks, benefits and costs of forgoing treatment.

This paternalistic view has gradually been supplanted by one promoting patient autonomy, whereby patients and doctors share the decision-making responsibility.

### Patients' Rights legal definition of Patients' Rights

The Rights of the Patients 1. Right to Appropriate Medical Care and Humane Treatment. - Every person has a right to health and medical care corresponding to his state of health, without any discrimination and within the limits of the resources, manpower and competence available for health and medical care at the relevant time.

Generally speaking, a patient has three main rights: the right to decide whether or not to undergo medical treatment, after receiving a reasonable explanation of what the treatment involves and the risks associated with the treatment the right to be treated with reasonable care and skill by a health care provider

Patient care is a discrete and important aspect of the right to health that merits attention and scrutiny as a human rights issue.
