Defining the stage helps physicians determine best treatments and aids communication between doctors and caregivers. Dementia is usually considered as three stages: mild (or “early”), moderate (or “middle”), and severe (or “late”). A more specific stage of dementia, however, is commonly assigned based on symptoms.

Seven Stages of Dementia | Symptoms, Progression & Durations

Mid-stage dementia is comprised of two stages. Stage 5, moderately severe cognitive decline and stage 6, severe cognitive decline, or middle dementia. Stage 5 Lasting an average of 4 years, a person in mid-stage dementia now needs assistance to complete activities of daily living.
